



Cherry Mae Chooses Hope

Whenever Cherry Mae is going through a rough patch, she closes her eyes and remembers what her former Chalice sponsor told her in a letter: "I'm proud of you."

A former sponsored child from our Bulacan sponsor site in the Philippines, Cherry Mae is now in her twenties. But she was part of the program for 15 years, and throughout that time, sponsorship made a profound impact on her life.

"...I'm so thankful to our Lord Jesus because He used Chalice and my sponsor as a channel of blessing to help me and my family to reach my dreams," Cherry Mae wrote in a letter to a staff member at our Canadian office.

When she entered the program, she was only seven years old, and lived with her family in a small home. Her generous sponsor's support allowed her to continue at school, all the way until she finished her post-secondary

education.

There were times, she admits, when she wanted to quit. After all, wouldn't it be more practical to leave school and work, so she could earn income for the family?

"But my determination to finish my studies and prove that you are not wrong for choosing me as one of the beneficiaries pushes me to pursue my dreams no matter what happens," Cherry Mae wrote.

That little push was what she needed. In 2018, Cherry Mae graduated and received her Bachelor of Education, a remarkable accomplishment. Even now, she knows in her heart her sponsor is still proud of her.

After finishing school, she got a job teaching in a private school, and recently passed the licensing exam for teachers in the Philippines. That means she can achieve her big dream: teaching in a public school.

"This achievement is not only for my family but also for Chalice and [my sponsor]," she wrote.

Now, one of Cherry Mae's favourite things is following along with stories from Chalice on social media – because she knows that, like her, those children will one day grow up and achieve their dreams.

Dennis Spreads Hope Around the World

A life-changing trip to Peru, a chance encounter, and an understanding of how poverty affects people in the developing world – these were the building blocks of Dennis's journey to becoming one of Chalice's most dedicated volunteers.

When he first visited Peru around 2015, Dennis was already sponsoring a child with Chalice. But he hadn't witnessed what it was like to live in a developing country with his own eyes, not until he accompanied his brother, Catholic priest Fr. Jim, on a trip to Peru.

There, his brother was to visit a woman who was sick in hospital and had been baptized, but hadn't received any other Sacraments.

"I said, 'Well, you go, and I'll just stay back', at the place we were staying," Dennis shared in an interview. "And they said, 'No, you should come, too."

That invitation changed his life. In hospital, he met Flor, a woman so sick she could hardly lift her head off the pillow. Fr. Jim heard her confession and gave her communion, and then Dennis came in and prayed for her, too.

"As I was leaving, I said to Jim, 'That dear soul's not going to make it, is she,'" Dennis said.

Jim replied that she was gravely ill, and it didn't look too good.

But where others see a dead end, God sees an open corridor.

Not only did Flor survive surgery, but when Dennis next visited, she was sitting in bed, "bright as ever."

For Dennis, it was like witnessing

a miracle

He knew he wanted to do something more to help, so naturally, he turned to Chalice.

With Chalice staff and volunteers by his side, Dennis helped raise money for Flor, allowing her to find a place to live.

When he next visited Peru, he was even able to visit Flor, where she welcomed him into her home.

Seeing the hope Chalice offered Flor, he knew he wanted to bring that same hope to others.

"If they're willing to work with me that way, then maybe I can do something back, as my way of saying thanks," he said.

Dennis became an active Chalice Champion, appealing for parishioners at his church to sponsor children of their own.

It was clear how Chalice benefited communities in the developing world, he said. On his first trip to Peru, he saw children benefitting from Chalice sponsorship and other community development projects.

"It moved me to a point where I felt...this is real work, and this is good, Christian work."



Share Love Ann is Back in **Action Once More**

Studious and bright, Ann's smile could light up a thousand rooms. This hard worker grew up with a widowed mother and three siblings, and though her mother tried, efforts to feed the family often came up short.

Fortunately, Ann was accepted into the Chalice sponsorship program, and to school at the Starehe Girls' Centre in Kenya. But misfortune still made its way towards her.

Several years ago, Ann began experiencing chest pains and aches when swallowing. When the pain spread to her right ear, she was diagnosed with a bacterial infection that stemmed from an earlier untreated infection. Staff at the Starehe site quickly submitted a request for Ann to receive funding for surgery through the Critical Needs program. Chalice supporters soon stepped up. She had two surgeries, and for a while, seemed okay. But 2020 spared no one. In September of that year, her ear pain returned, accompanied by numbness in her right hand and leg. Basic tasks became challenging, and the numbness left her unable to walk.

After several delays, she was finally booked in for surgery at the end of January 2021 – but one problem remained. She was still unable to afford the surgery, and without it, feared she might die.

In that moment, Chalice supporters were there to help. The Starehe Girls site submitted a second critical needs request, and ultimately, the

entire cost of the surgery was funded. Now, she's recovering at home, and working with a physiotherapist to strengthen her arms, hands and legs once more.

"We are grateful to you our dear sponsors for your incredible generosity that you have shown Ann so far," writes Sr. Jane, the director of Starehe Girls' Centre. "May God bless you in amazing ways and keep you and your families safe always.

Chalice has worked with the Little Servants of Mary Immaculate Sisters in Zambia since 1997 – making them one of our oldest partnerships overseas. Working in education, health, and pastoral care, there's almost nothing they can't do with prayer and hard work. But there was one problem.

A long-term care home for senior Sisters near our Serenje site was in desperate disrepair. Termites took to the property and destroyed it; the doors and floors were worn; and the toilets were broken.

With all those obstacles, some people might have given up. But not this group of Sisters. With determination and a bit of help from Chalice gift catalogue donors, change was underway.

Thanks to generous gift catalogue donations, the Sisters repaired an entire wing for their elderly counterparts. Living conditions are much improved, making the Sisters' lives far more comfortable. Thank you to our gift catalogue donors for making it happen!

Just One Child

It's only one family, one child.

When I heard a comment noting how small a difference sponsorship can make, I had to agree... except for that child, that family. What are the differences. the changes that are made – and are they small,

insignificant? Since we started sending funds directly to the children's parents or guardians and regularly gathering to listen to them, we've heard stories of hope and struggle, celebrations and sorrow, conflict, and resolution. That's life. Through sponsorship, the discussions within small groups, the exchange of small financial gifts, and in the stories told, we share life together. I know that does not seem like a big difference or change, except for the times when it has made a difference and change. At that moment, whether big or small, it was all that was needed.

If it was Flor in Peru, Cherry Mae in the Philippines, Ann in Kenya or the Sisters in long term care in Zambia, there were moments of need, and in those small moments Chalice sponsors and donors were there to respond with loving kindness. Like all of us, who have momentary needs, it is then we discover if we can turn to a friend, family member, or even our employer. We want to stand on our own and be independent, and usually we are. But in that small moment of need, and that small gift of kindness, we experience God in our world. And when we are that person for another, we discover the truth of Mother Teresa's words, in this world, "God has no hands but yours."

Thank you for offering your hand to the poor, for it was, is and always will be an offering to God. At Chalice, we call it our prayer in action.

Sponsorship Rate Increase

After much prayer and consideration, for the first time in seven years, Chalice is asking you to increase your monthly sponsorship donation by \$5, to \$42 per month. This \$5 increase will ensure the standard of care for your sponsored child remains as high

The cost of living in both Canada and developing countries has increased significantly. This greatly reduces our buying power, and means the sponsor sites can't buy the same amount of food and medicine they could seven years ago. Basic needs are still met, of course, but it's becoming increasingly challenging to maintain a sustainable standard of care.

If you currently pay for sponsorship through automatic withdrawal from your bank account, or by credit card, your donation will increase automatically to \$42 with your July payment. A Prayer for Ukraine

On February 24, Russian forces invaded Ukraine, upending lives and changing the world permanently.

More than 300 sponsored children have left the country, mostly for Poland, but others have gone to Germany, Italy, and the Czech Republic. If we know your sponsored child has left Ukraine, we will contact you. With love, we ask for supporters not to call us to find out whether their sponsored child has left. When we know, we will contact you directly.

Children who have left will continue to receive their sponsorship funds, so there's no need to cancel a sponsorship or switch to another child. Many families desire to return to Ukraine once the war ends.

Chalice's Ukraine Regional Assistance Fund has raised more than \$500,000, and money has already been sent over. A special thank you to our private donor who matched donations until they reached \$250,000. The fund covers basic needs such as food, water, and shelter, for sponsored children, their families, and our staff in Ukraine.

As you will understand, we are living in uncertain times. Details being shared today may change tomorrow. But the one thing that remains consistent is Christ, who stands by all Ukrainians amid their suffering. In response, we offer a simple prayer.

Lord Jesus Christ, Prince of Peace, bring peace to Ukraine and its people. We pray for their safety and strength as they endure the evils of war. We ask for Your protection over all our sponsored children, their families, and our staff in Ukraine. Amen.

A Q&A with Fr. Leo Patalinghug

Meet Fr. Leo! He's a Catholic priest and chef who will speak at our online June event, Love in the Kitchen, running Corpus Christi weekend, June 18th and 19th. It's all about how food can feed both body and soul.

1. Tell us a bit about yourself!

I'm a Catholic priest, ordained on June 5th, 1999, originally for the Archdiocese of Baltimore, and now as a member of a consecrated secular institute, Voluntas Dei. I was born in the Philippines and immigrated to America when I was two years old. I lived in Baltimore most of my life, except when I lived in Italy for seminary. Now, my main work is evangelization through food. I'm a priest and professional chef, founder of PlatingGrace.com, and I travel for my TV show, as well as for speaking and cooking events, telling people about how God provides food for them in body, mind, and soul.

2. Tell us about your conversion experience.

My conversion experience happened when I met a missionary priest, who explained the Mass and helped me see how God is present in the Eucharist. I also traveled to Medjugorje where I experienced the universal church and the Blessed Mother's prayers for us.

3. What do you love most about being a priest?

Celebrating the sacraments, preaching the good news and giving people a sense of God's love for them.

4. From a regular priest to hosting your own cooking show - how did that happen?

God has unique plans, and if we share our passions and talents with God, He can turn it into a ministry. I didn't get ordained to have a cooking show, but after years of pastoral work and sharing my love for serving a meal, I saw how God put people in my place and created opportunities that led to a Throw Down with [celebrity chef] Bobby Flay, and eventually my own food and faith show.

5. Why is food relevant to ministry?

I wrote a book, Epic Food Fight, that discusses the power of food to do good. A theology of food helps us recognize how Jesus became food for the soul and a remedy to the spiritual hungers.

6. Tell us about a memorable experience you've had because of cooking.

The most memorable was winning the competition between me and

I hope to make deeper connections to faith, food, family, friends and the fun we can celebrate together.

8. What can attendees expect from you?

I hope people will experience a deeper message about how God feeds His people: body, mind and soul.

It's because it inspires people to serve others, and in so doing, people can taste and see the goodness of the Lord.

Lunches Made with Love

Norma and Kevin are a couple of people with big hearts! Norma is the grandmother of Maximiliano and Jordan, while Kevin is their great uncle. They take care of the young boys near our Dominica site in Paraguay, ensuring they have enough to grow up healthy.

Unsteady employment, though, sometimes makes that a challenge. Kevin works as a bricklayer, work that isn't always sustainable. Norma has a job with a meat processing company, but her income depends on the plant's production output. They work hard, but providing for the boys is difficult.

The challenges grew worse when the boys began school, and Norma wasn't sure she would have enough income to feed Maximiliano and Jordan during the school days.

That was when her knowledgeable Chalice Circle Group suggested enrolling the boys in the Dominicia site's lunch program, supported by Chalice's Nutrition Fund.

Quickly, Norma's worries faded, as the boys grew strong and their attention spans grew sharper. They've made huge strides academically!

Now, Norma can put the money she saves on lunch costs into other household needs. Her prayer is that the nutrition program will reach every child in need, and that every child will know the faith and love that goes into each bite.


